Fresh Film Festival

There was great excitement in Heaney recently as the class got to pay a visit to the cinema. The Odeon was the venue for the Irish Young Filmmaker of the Year Awards. The movies that the children had made as part of the Blast Arts in Education project had been selected as finalists and the whole class was in attendance for the screening. They spent the whole day in the cinema watching movies made by children from all over the country. Mikey Mahon from fifth class Yeats and Fiadh Browne from sixth class Nolan had also had movies selected for the final. Tension levels peaked as the last of the movies finished and Mary-Claire Fitzpatrick of RTE made her way to the podium to announce the award winners. There were huge celebrations amongst the Scoil Ide children as Mikey Mahon was presented with the award for third place overall.

The Otter Project

Our OTTER EU project is called "Water in my Life" and aims to promote science education outside the classroom and is the start of our campaign to make Corbally Baths swimmable again. The project involves 2nd and 6th class students. Funded by the EU, The School of Education at the University of Limerick is partnering with the project to integrate sustainability and education. We are the only primary school in Ireland selected for this innovative project.

Recently, our students visited the School of Education at UL and the SSP Center to learn about water quality in our lives, bacteria, and nature. Learning outside the classroom has been shown to be highly beneficial for students, especially in science education.

Super Well

Junior and Senior Infants in Scoil ide have collaborated with the psychology department in UL to develop a picture book intervention to support children's Emotional Literacy. Children in the infant classes have developed their emotion identification and problem-solving skills. One of the protective factors to pupil wellbeing is creating opportunities to develop Emotional Literacy. Research has shown Emotionally literate pupils have a positive self-image, positive view of their school experience, improved mental health and it directly benefits academic achievement.

Junior Entrepreneurial Programme (JEP)

This year, 6th year Boland took part in the Junior Entrepreneur Programme, which has opened a whole range of new opportunities for us. Months of background work, learning about our strengths and qualities, working on our communication skills, pitching our ideas to the dragons and meeting and learning from local entrepreneurs, culminated in a successful showcase of "Bows and Bandanas from Capulanas" on Friday, April 28th. We showcased our bows and bandanas and took orders for future sales. Business is booming in Boland! We think we are excellent entrepreneurs!

Coding club

We are running a Coding Club for the next five weeks on Wednesdays after school from 14:45-15:45 The club will consist of 8 children from out 5th and 6th classes and will be taught by Giuseppe Torre from UL who will be assisted by teacher Aisling Kennedy

Coding Club will take place in the MakerSpace and laptops will be provided to the children and sessions will focus on 1: : Intro to Linux operating system and Open Source culture, installing Linux on PC/Laptop, dual Installation procedure 4Installing Software: apt install routine and/or APK, 5: Linux for Games and Arts

Litter Awareness Campaign

Over the past few weeks we have been conducting a litter awareness campaign in the school. The campaign involved litter picking, analyzing, researching, interviewing and a lot of discussion. Unfortunately, litter has gotten worse around the school in recent years, and the amount of litter is truly shocking when gathered up in one place. The children have learned about the long lasting damage that litter can do to our health and about the damage plastic litter causes to ocean wildlife in particular.

The children analysed the litter and found that sweet wrappers are the main component of our litter, and that recycling aluminium cans saves a lot of pollution going into the atmosphere. There can also be quite an amount of litter that originates from outside the school but ends up on our grounds.

The message is that it is all our responsibility to keep our environment clean and that our actions impact on others less fortunate than us around the world. Small changes can make a big difference. If possible, please consider removing wrappers from your child's lunch at home, as they are often unnecessary within the lunchbox. Thank you
