The Public Health Team were on site in Scoil Íde in the MakerSpace at the end of April to conduct hearing and vision testing.


80 children (predominantly Junior Infants) were tested over three days and we sincerely thank Connie Blackwell from the HSE's Roxtown Clinic for her great work.




Our Outdoor Class-room:



















Robotics Club

Primary Schoolbook Scheme

For the 2025/26 school year all students in primary schools in the Free Education Scheme will receive free schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks. These will be in place in time for the start of the new school year.

This scheme is being implemented by Minister for Education Helen McEntee TD. It is in recognition of the cost of preparing children and young people for the return to school. The cost of providing schoolbooks and core classroom resources will now be borne by the State. The scheme will ensure equity of access, where all children and young people enrolled in primary schools in the Free Education Scheme can commence the new school year in 2025/26 with the same schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks, as other children and young people in their class.

Funding for the scheme in 2025/26 is being provided directly to primary schools by the Department of Education. Schools now have responsibility for providing schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks, to all pupils at the start of the 2025/26 school year.

All schoolbooks will remain the property of the school so that they can be reused in future years. Schoolbooks will be provided on loan to children and young people for the duration of the school year and must be returned to school at the end of the school year.

Parents/Guardians are requested to remind their child/children to take care of their schoolbooks and keep them in good condition during the year. It is not permitted to write on schoolbooks.

*For the 2025/26 school year parents/guardians will be required to purchase stationery for use by their child/ren during the school year. This stationery list will be available on our website in mid June, 2025.

The school will request €60 per child towards the cost of classroom supplies as it always has at the start of the school year.
































Importance of skin protection for children

The HSE's National Cancer Control Programme (NCCP), in collaboration with Healthy Ireland has asked us to promote the following message in our school community.

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Ireland with almost 13,0001 new cases diagnosed annually. UV exposure during the first 10–15 years of life makes a disproportionately large contribution to lifetime risk of skin cancer.

Playing and spending time outdoors is good for children. However, it is important to protect children's skin when out in the sun. Too much exposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation can lead to sun damage, sunburn and skin cancer. Children and young people are particularly vulnerable to the damaging effects of UV radiation from the sun. Severe sunburn during childhood (3 or more instances before the age of 20) is associated with a 2-4 times higher risk of developing melanoma skin cancer in later life.

The easiest way to protect children's skin from UV is to follow the SunSmart 5 S's especially from April to September:

- 1. Slip on clothing: We need to cover our skin as much as we can, using tops
- that have long sleeves to cover your arms and collars to cover your neck.

 2. Slop on sunscreen: Children need a stronger sunscreen than adults, with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 50, while adults should wear a sunscreen with a SPF of at least 30. The sunscreen you use should be water resistant with high UVA protection and be reapplied every couple of hours. No sunscreen can provide 100% protection; it should be used with other measures such as clothing and shade.
- 3. Slap on a wide brimmed hat: This will shade your face, ears and neck from the sun.
 - 4. Seek shade: Especially if outdoors between 11am and 3pm.
 - 5. Slide on sunglasses with UV protection: Guard your eyes from harm.

Even when it is cloudy, you should protect your skin as the sun's UV rays can travel through cloud. Also important to remember do not deliberately try to get a suntan. Avoid getting a sunburn. Never use a sunbed.

Wearing a wide-brimmed hat that protects the face, neck and ears is one of the simplest and most effective ways to do this as these are common sites of skin damage and skin cancer as they are constantly exposed to the elements and therefore, generally receive more UV radiation exposure than other parts of the body.

Wide-brimmed hats, including bucket and legionnaire style hats, provide protection for all of these areas. Baseball style hats are not recommended, as these styles do not provide adequate cover adéquate coverage to protect the ears, cheeks or neck.
