### WELCOME BACK

Scoil Íde celebrates its 60th Anniversary this year having first opened its doors in Rooms 1 and 2 in 1964.

The story of Scoil Íde is very much the story of the community which grew and developed in Corbally. It is also a story of changing parish boundaries. In modern times we're in our third parish without moving an inch. Scoil Íde started life as a 2 classroom & 2 teacher Junior School, operated by the Mercy Sisters for the Parish of St Mary's. Sr Pierre was the first principal.

However the population of Corbally was growing rapidly and it became clear that Scoil Íde needed to grow accordingly. By 1971 there were 8 teachers on staff & a Lollipop man who also served as a general caretaker. By 1974 the school had grown to have 18 teachers, 730 children & Tom Barry, who became principal in 1971, was granted the post of administrative principal. It wasn't until 1976 that the school had 19 permanent classrooms.

Elaine Flannery and Des Hickey arrived to support the smooth running of one of the largest schools in Munster at the time. At its peak there were 930 students, 40 teachers and 29 classes.

When Tom Barry retired in 1992, Peter Long became principal. Peter pioneered the STEM revolution in Scoil Íde as well as guiding, encouraging & promoting numerous initiatives across the curriculum. More building work was also undertaken during Peter's principalship. This saw the replacement of prefabs with the Senior School building.


When Peter retired in 2018, Grace Burke had the onerous task of leading the school through Covid 19 until her tenure as Principal ended when she moved to Mayo in 2020 to take up a role as principal there. Ray D'Arcy became the fifth principal in Scoil Ide's history in January 2021 having taught in the school since 2002.

**Absence alerts:** Every time we mark a child absent in school, you will receive a notification via the Aladdin system.

Left To Their Own Devices is Cybersafe Kids' Annual Trends and Usage Report. It provides a detailed overview of data collected in the 2023-24 academic year from over 7,000 children (aged 8-14) across Ireland.

#### Some key findings:

• 25% of primary school children (aged 8-12) and 21% of secondary school children (aged 12-14) have been bothered or upset by online experiences

• For this 25%, this most commonly occurred on YouTube (37%) and Roblox (23%) for 8-12 year olds. For the 21% of secondary children (aged 12-14), Snapchat (41%) and TikTok (30%) were identified as the most common platforms where these negative experiences occur

• 42% of 8-12 year olds, and 62% of 12-14 year olds do not talk to their parents about their online activity

• 77% of 8-12 year olds say their parents can't see what they are doing online and 83% can use devices in their bedrooms

 YouTube (75%) WhatsApp (41%), Roblox (40%), Snapchat (36%) and TikTok (33%) are the most popular platforms for this age group.

• 38% of 8-12 year olds gamed with strangers online

• Almost 65% were contacted by a stranger during an online game and 55% of 8-12 year olds did not tell a parent when bothered by harmful content or unsolicited contact, rising to 63% for 12-14 year olds.

#### **Secondary School Open Nights**

There is a Common Application System in operation in Limerick. The schedule of Open Nights for secondary schools in the Limerick Area has been emailed to all parents and guardians. If you are going through this process for the first time we highly advise that you attend the open nights of any secondary school that you are considering sending your child to. It is also a good idea to seek the advice of like minded parents / guardians who have sent a child of their own to the secondary school you are considering. The children will receive the a hard copy of the application form in early October and this will also be emailed to parents and quardians soon after.
